
MISSION STATEMENT

JOHNSON COUNTY



The Johnson County Sheriff's Office provides primary law enforcement protection for the unincorporated areas of Johnson County.

The Patrol Division also provides contractual law enforcement protection for Hills, Lone Tree, Oxford, Shueyville, Solon, Swisher, and Tiffin. Deputies are responsible for patrolling 36 miles of interstate highways, 54 miles of state highways and 909 miles of county roads. Specialty units within the Patrol Division include a K-9 Unit, the Sheriff's Emergency Response Team (SERT), Water Search and Rescue, Water Patrol and the Johnson County Metro Bomb Squad.









JAIL ALTERNATIVES/CIT

JAIL ALTERNATIVES

Johnson County Jail Alternatives is a program set in place to provide an opportunity for treatment services to individuals with mental health and co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders who have come into contact with the criminal justice system. The program works to connect individuals to the appropriate level of community-based treatment for their mental health and co-occurring needs in hopes of improving their overall quality of life and reducing their involvement in the criminal justice system.

Since its inception, Johnson County Jail Alternatives has served a total of 1,860 unduplicated individuals. In Fiscal Year 2019, 108 unduplicated individuals were served, with a total of 112 individuals served overall. The various referral sources for Jail Alternatives include 90% from jail, 6% from the Department of Correctional Services, and 4% from Hospitals, Services Providers, and self-referrals. Jail Alternatives staff participates in a variety of committees including but not limited to: Disproportionate Minority Contact Subcommittee, Jail Systems Committee, Local Homeless Coordinating Board, Johnson County Suicide Prevention Coalition, Johnson County System of Care, Iowa Therapeutic Alternatives to Incarceration, Coordinated Entry Committee, GuideLink Steering and Executive Committees, and East Central Region Advisory Board.

This year, Jail Alternatives staff served as a panelist and/or presented at the following conferences: Iowa Stepping Up Summit, University of Iowa Medical Psychiatry Nursing Conference, Iowa Mental Health Conference, National Association of Counties legislative conference in Washington DC, and also provided consultation for new jail diversion programs throughout the state of Iowa. Jail Alternatives was also a grantee for the Data Driven Justice Grant through Arnold Ventures, collecting and researching data specific to frequent utilizers of various community services including jails, homeless shelters, emergency rooms, and other crisis services.

METRO CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM (CIT)

Jail Alternatives also coordinates the 40-hour Johnson County Metro Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training. This training nurtures community partnerships of law enforcement, mental health, and addiction professionals, individuals who live with mental illness and/or addiction disorders, their families, and other advocates. The CIT training model allows law enforcement and other emergency responders to appropriately respond to individuals in crisis, while also promoting all around safety and wellness. Currently with the exception of new hires, the majority of local law enforcement has completed this training, and as of this year, CIT is being hosted once annually in Johnson County.

The Johnson County Metro Crisis Intervention Team has trained individuals from the following agencies: Johnson County Sheriff's Office, Johnson County Ambulance, Iowa City Police Department, Iowa City Fire Department, Coralville Police Department, University of Iowa Police Department, North Liberty Police Department, University Heights Police Department, VA Police Department, Iowa State Patrol, Joint Emergency Communications Center, University of Iowa Hospital Security, Department of Correctional Services, East Central Region, and other Iowa communities. To date, a total of 401 individuals have completed the training.
